- Explored the drivers behind new patterns of rhetoric and decision-making related to migration in Havana, Cuba, specifically an increased willingness of some parents to encourage their teenage and young adult children to undertake extremely risky illegal migration routes such as "la travesía".
- Developed an intergenerational interview method in which parents and their teenage/young adult children discuss parents' experiences of the Special Period (Cuba's last major economic crisis), and how those experiences impact the expectations, fears, and imagined futures the parents have for their children, and the children have for themselves.

- This research-outreach project consists of a set of seven creative practice community events that create space for newcomer youth to make knowledge about their experiences of belonging using collective art creation and participatory community mapping, in response to a recent rise in youth overdoses, suicides and murders in the community of Dartmouth North, Nova Scotia, Canada.
- Creative outputs of this project include a public mural (a mosaic made of 575 individual tiles painted by community members) installed on the exterior wall of the Boys and Girls Club of Dartmouth North, and an interactive digital Story Map created with ArcGIS software using community members' perceptions of the neighbourhood.

- Assessed the impact of the curriculum delivery and knowledge brokerage activities on policymakers' through pre and post in-person interviews and Knowledge, Attitudes, and Practices questionnaires.
- Developed interactive performance/simulation- and games-based activities to engage Southeast Asian policymakers in shared learning workshops to address urban climate justice issues.
